I've received this email from former member, Carol Low, who has been in London for some time. She is keeping busy with a major oral history project. Carol says:

"This may be of interest to your e-newsletter readers - it is work I have been involved with in London since mid-2014.

I initiated and then co-led the project which culminated in a 3 month exhibition in partnership with the Brent Museum: the themes were drawn from oral histories with local people who had lived in this area during the 1930s to 1960s - remembering how we Kept it Local, Made do and Mended, and Connected in Community.

Have had a lovely time doing this during my London sojourn - and now there is talk of taking the stories or the exhibition materials further.
