Memory meets imagination to reflect on the changing nature of motherhood in Australia, over the past sixty years. Mothering is an inevitable part of life, but cultural expectations about the role of mothers have varied considerably. Mothers are sometimes described as

angels- an embodiment of virtue- but they've also been villains, and at other times, victims. Alongside personal recollections, we also hear how a selection of Australian poets have given voice to their ideas about motherhood.

This Conference will be held in Melbourne 30-31 October, 2014. Pioneering US oral and public historian Michael Frisch will be an international participant at the Australian Generations Conference to be held at Monash (Caulfield Campus) in Melbourne. He will join members of the research team for a day workshop on 30 October, in which project researchers will discuss a set of draft articles presenting empirical and theoretical findings from the research project. 12. Scholarships for New Zealand Oral History Conference

Oral History Queensland is pleased to offer members 2 x \$500.00 scholarships towards the cost of attending the New Zealand Oral History Conference in Wellington, New Zealand from 19 to 21 September 2014. Application for the scholarships will close on 10 June 2014 and preference will be given to first-time applicants.

To be eligible for a scholarship:

- 1. You must be a current financial member of Oral History Queensland (and also financial for 2014/2015).
- 2. You are attending the New Zealand Oral History Conference in Wellington in September 2014.
- 3. You must have no funding from any other institution, grant etc.
- 4. You must be currently enrolled in tertiary studies involving oral history OR currently working on an oral history related project and demonstrate how you are using oral history as part of your project or research.

- 5. You will be expected to attend the whole conference (including workshops on the first day).
- 6. You will provide a comprehensive report on the conference reviewing the sessions you attend, a general overview of the conference, impressions of speakers and fellow attendees which will be published in the October 2014 e-Bulletin (to be forwarded to Newsletter Editor Suzanne Mulligan <u>mulligan53@iinet.net.au</u> by 17 October 2014). To this end you will need to take thorough notes and photographs to accompany the report. If practicable you may add posts to our Facebook page while in Wellington. Depending on your availability and location you will also be required to give a presentation at our Annual General Meeting in October 2014.

You must provide name, contact details, details of university course (if applicable) and provide a statement of approximately 500 words explaining what you hope to gain by attending the New Zealand Conference addressing all the issues as shown above.

Karen Reeds recently asked about consent forms on the on the H-OralHist Discussion List. She said:

"My family is engaged in our own informal oral history project -- one of us (not me) interviewing our two oldest members every weekend by phone/Skype. Although the elders doubt their stories would interest anyone outside the family, I'm very conscious that historians might find some of the material fascinating.

Because I raised the issue of an "advanced directive" for the interviews, I've been delegated to find models of consent forms that would let our elders decide how these interviews get used and preserved. (I can think of at least two suitable institutions with existing oral history collections.)"

18. Boston College's Belfast Project

This controversial project has been in the media for the last year, finally culminating in the inevitable arrest of Gerry Adams this month. There has been debate in the media about the ethics of the project that allowed a small and specific release of interviews connecting Gerry Adams to one particular murder in Northern Ireland in the 1970s. The interviewees in the project consented to be interviewed on the condition they would not be released until after their death. This has raised concerns about the confidentiality of oral history interviews. Professor Thomson is an internationally renowned oral historian, author and radio documentarian. Going away to school has been part of the education of a wide range of people in Australia. This program draws on the memories of eight people born between the 1920s and the 1980s, all of whom spent part of their schooling away from home. The circumstances varied, from an elite boarding school to a state hostel. Their experiences reflect attitudes of the time, some of which have changed, while others persist to the present day.
