Reflective Surface Paradise

This is a tour of the reflective surfaces of inner Brisbane. It will take place within one of the city's multi-dimensional reflective surfaces. It is a bus tour of Brisbane's street signs. The tour will be hosted by **Greg Manning**. Greg is interested in stories highlighted by combinations of place names. Combinations of place names are generated by land use in the form of addresses, journeys, traffic reports, etc. These combinations create opportunities for active, relevant, inclusive and multi-faceted historical conversations. Since we will be meeting during the Commonwealth Games, we will reflect on the stories Brisbane street names evoke when they are activated by events on the Gold Coast. By viewing our street names from two different 'usage' perspectives, this tour will highlight some of the collaborations and the contests that have shaped the populations who implement these words in their own land use. This year the theme of our conference focuses on the sweet sound of the voice, the singers of tales (te waha kairongorongo), storytellers, and the resonance of the voice through time and space. How is oral history transient through time and space? How do the voices of our participants travel through, or resonate in, time and space as a vehicle for memory? What significance do we find in the spaces we use to access, listen to, co-create, and present voices that give meaning and memory to the past? 5. Abortion Stories Oral History Project

Melissa Madera has posted on the H-OralHist List:

"I am the founder of <u>The Abortion Diary</u>, producer of The Abortion Diary's podcast (a podcast of abortion stories), and curator of <u>ar-ti-facts: abortion stories and histories</u>, an immersive, traveling multimedia exhibit sharing the stories of people, like me, who have had abortions. Since beginning the project in July 2013, I have listened to and recorded over 290 people share their reproductive experiences. These experiences are quite diverse across geographic location (33 U.S. states and 21 countries), socioeconomic background, age (18-85.5), ethnicity, race, religion, and gender, and

span from the late 1950s to 2016. This unique project is aimed at amplifying the voices of people who have had abortions, drawing attention to restrictive laws and difficulties in obtaining abortion across the United States (and abroad), creating community around an experience that can be extremely isolating, and facilitating community conversations around an issue that is highly politicized and polarizing with the use of oral histories, audio stories, images, objects, multimedia storytelling, interactive exhibits, and powerful performances. The Abortion Diary and ar-ti-facts: abortion stories and histories allow people to understand and witness real life experiences of people who have had abortions, and create culture change around abortion in our communities."
