6. Queensland Library Foundation

Did you know the <u>Queensland Library Foundation</u> through the generosity of its donors and supporters contributes to the work of State Library in diverse and exciting ways? Helping to bring community together and to inspire knowledge, stories and creativity, the Foundation supports collections, conservation and preservation initiatives, digital projects, regional education and more to benefit Queenslanders.

In 2018 the Foundation raised \$140,000 in their end of financial year campaign which supported film and video digitisation. As a result, the <u>William (Bill) M. Rahmann collection</u> of 16 short films captured between 1948 to ca.1987 are now available on State Library's catalogue One Search.

All are unique to Queensland, including one reflecting on the demise of trams in Brisbane in 1969. *End of an Era* (Reel 13) contains sound and wonderful footage of trams in Brisbane. *Anne Tunnecliffe, Queensland Library Foundation Queensland Memory*
