1. Oral History Network of Ireland National Conference

The Oral History Network of Ireland (OHNI) is pleased to announce its 2020 conference on the theme of "Storytelling and Oral History." Allowing participants to tell their unique stories in their own words is key to the work of oral historians. This conference offers oral history practitioners an opportunity to reflect on the role played by storytelling within interviews, the factors that shape the telling of a story, and the potential future uses of those stories after the interview. This two-day conference will take place in Maynooth University on Friday 19th and Saturday 20th June 2020. Deadline to submit proposal 21 February 2020. 2. Beyond Camps and Forced Labour

Call for Papers - Current International Research on Survivors of Nazi Persecution (deadline: 31 March 2020). Seventh international multidisciplinary conference, to be held at Birkbeck, University of London, and The Wiener Holocaust Library, London, 6-8 January 2021.

This conference is planned as a follow-up to the six successful conferences which took place at Imperial War Museum London in 2003, 2006, 2009, 2012, 2015, and at Birkbeck, University of London, and The Wiener Holocaust Library in 2018. It will continue to build on areas previously investigated, and also open up new fields of academic enquiry. This new site takes things a little but further down the line for locative audio as a field unto itself, and for producers and has, I feel, applications for all sorts of areas: from sound design to oral history, to history, to transmedia, to locative journalism/tourism etc. I have been invited in as an advisor on their panel and have accepted, so you'll probably hear a little more in due course."

9. Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF)

A number of Oral History Queensland members have over the years accessed funds available through the RADF to complete an oral history project. A new round of the funding begins on 28 January 2020 and ends on 6 April 2020, see <https://www.arts.qld.gov.au/regional-arts-development-fund>.

A Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) grant from Paroo Shire Council supported Margie. She recorded oral histories with station owners, pastoral workers and business owners in districts including Cunnamulla, Thargomindah, Eulo, Quilpie and Winton. A member has informed us about a transcription program – [oTranscribe](#), described as “a free web app to take the pain out of transcribing recorded interviews.” You can insert a time

code when you wish to do so. Other transcription programs are Transcriber and Express Scribe. If you are transcribing, you need to find the program that is right for you.

- Gambling Community Benefit Fund - Grants are allocated to not-for-profit community groups to enhance their capacity to provide services, leisure activities and opportunities for Queensland communities. Funds: \$500 – \$35,000. Find more information [here](#).
- Churchill Fellowship - To enable Australian citizens to travel overseas to investigate a topic or an issue that they are passionate about. It is for anyone who feels they have exhausted alternatives within Australia and would like to see what other countries are doing successfully in a similar space to inspire new ideas, innovation, and excellence. 100 fellowships, average fellowship \$25,000 for Australian citizens over the age of 18. No prescribed qualifications are required in order to apply for a Churchill Fellowship, however, the Fellowship is not designed to enable applicants to complete tertiary qualifications. North Stradbroke Island Museum on Minjerribah have installed their first exhibition for 2020. ‘Figuring Minjerribah’ paints a picture of the current society and economy of Minjerribah/ North Stradbroke Island.
