Launceston, Tasmania from 14-16 October 2021.

Oral History Tasmania and Oral History Australia has released a Call for Presentations for the upcoming OHA Biennial Conference. The conference theme is 'Oral History in Troubling Times: Challenges and Opportunities'. While we plan to meet in solidarity and optimism for our biennial conference in Tasmania in 2021, if that proves to be impossible due to COVID-19 restrictions we will run our conference online. 10. Bursaries for OHQ Members – an update

Oral History Queensland is offering a number of bursaries to attend the Oral History Australia National Conference in Launceston, Tasmania in October 2021. Each bursary will cover the conference registration fee (includes Welcome Drinks), plus \$200 to assist with travel and/or accommodation. The Conference Dinner or additional workshops are not included so will need to be self-funded.

You may have noted that registration for the Conference is not yet open. Please note the Call for Presentations has now been extended to **1 April 2021**. Therefore, the close of applications for the bursary has also been extended.

To be eligible for the bursary:

1. You must be a financial member of Oral History Queensland as at 1 July 2021.
2. You are attending at least the two days of the National Conference 15-16 October 2021
3. You must have no funding from any other institution, grant etc.
4. You must be currently enrolled in tertiary studies involving oral history OR currently working on an oral history related project and can demonstrate how you are using oral history as part of your project or research.
5. The successful applicants will provide a comprehensive report on the conference – reviewing the sessions you attend, a general overview of the conference, impressions of speakers and fellow attendees – which will be published in the 31 October 2021 e-Bulletin (to be forwarded to Editor Suzanne Mulligan mulligan53@iinet.net.au by 27 October 2021). To this end you will need to take thorough notes with photographs to accompany the report.

You must provide name, contact details, details of university course (if applicable) and provide a statement of approximately 500 words explaining what you hope to gain by attending the National Conference, addressing the issues as shown above.

Please email your application to info@ohq.org.au by 15 April 2021. The successful applicants will be advised by 30 April 2021.
