1. Bursaries for OHQ Members

Oral History Queensland is offering a number of bursaries to attend the Oral History Australia National Conference in Launceston, Tasmania in October 2021. Each bursary will cover the conference registration fee (includes Welcome Drinks), plus \$200 to assist with travel and/or accommodation. The Conference Dinner or additional workshops are not included so will need to be self-funded.

You may have noted that registration for the Conference is not yet open. Please note the Call for Presentations closes on **1 March 2021**.

To be eligible for the bursary:

1. You must be a financial member of Oral History Queensland as at 1 July 2021.

2. You are attending at least the two days of the National Conference 15-16 October 2021
3. You must have no funding from any other institution, grant etc.
4. You must be currently enrolled in tertiary studies involving oral history OR currently working on an oral history related project and can demonstrate how you are using oral history as part of your project or research.
5. The successful applicants will provide a comprehensive report on the conference – reviewing the sessions you attend, a general overview of the conference, impressions of speakers and fellow attendees – which will be published in the 31 October 2021 e-Bulletin (to be forwarded to Editor Suzanne Mulligan mulligan53@iinet.net.au by 27 October 2021). To this end you will need to take thorough notes with photographs to accompany the report.

You must provide name, contact details, details of university course (if applicable) and provide a statement of approximately 500 words explaining what you hope to gain by attending the National Conference, addressing the issues as shown above.

In the final week of Conversations for 2020 Richard Fidler and Sarah Kanowski selected some of the year's stand-out programs. Listen to all five episodes:

[Peter O'Brien](#) was a newly qualified teacher when he was sent on a challenging posting in 1960. He took up the job in the tiny town of Weabonga in country NSW, teaching eighteen children of varying ages in a one-room schoolhouse.

[Joy McKean](#) grew up in a musical family, singing country songs with her sister Heather and playing several instruments. She married Slim Dusty in 1951 and they soon began touring Australia in a caravan. Performing all over the country became a feature of their lives together.

[Peggy McDonald](#) has been a wildlife carer for most of her life. Some years ago she established the Higher Ground Raptor Centre in rural NSW to care for injured birds of prey.

[John Doyle](#) grew up in the 1950s and 60s in Lithgow, a small town west of Sydney where the main employers were the gun factory and the local coal mine. Life at home was often difficult, as John's sister Jen had been born with a condition we would now know as autism.

[Nardi Simpson](#) is a Yuwaalaraay writer, storyteller and performer from the freshwater plains of northwest New South Wales.

“When the pandemic hit, Philip F. Napoli, associate professor and chair of the Brooklyn College Department of History, knew that this semester's oral history class was going to present unique challenges for both pedagogy and technical operation. Students learned about oral history and were responsible for conducting at least 7 hours of interviews with 5 unique narrators culminating in creating their own podcast episode.
