# 4. 2022 Queensland Memory – Research Fellows and Award Recipients

State Library announced the 2022 research fellows and award recipients at a special event hosted at State Library by the Queensland Library Foundation on 6 October 2022. Dr. Mimi Tsai, <u>2022 John Oxley Library Fellow</u>, will explore the role of people-place relationships, examining three diverse cases: prison farming in H.M. penal establishment on St. Helena Island, Queensland war gardens and Chinese market gardening. Professor Anna Johnston, <u>2022 John Oxley Library Honorary Fellow</u>, will explore the representation of colonial violence in Queensland writing, including fiction, memoirs, and non-fiction accounts.

The <u>2022 Queensland Business Leaders Hall of Fame Fellowship</u> was awarded to Mary Howells for her project 'Trittons: furnishing Queensland'. Mary will examine the business from various perspectives, including Tritton's devotion to Queensland enterprise, use of advertising, and support for the arts.

# 6. Conducting Intergenerational Interviews

"While winter break often coincides with holiday visits or Zoom calls with loved ones across the country, your kids might use this as an opportunity for intergenerational interviews. Asking a few simple questions with a careful listening ear can cultivate connection and might even reveal stories that haven't been heard by the rest of the family just yet: "What was your neighborhood like growing up?," "What family celebrations stick out most to you?," or "What do you remember most about your favorite teacher?" The Smithsonian Center for Folklife and Cultural Heritage has created an <u>oral history interviewing guide</u> to get you started. Across the Smithsonian, we also have several other video <u>examples, tips, and resources</u> to provide you with lots of ideas for what questions to ask and how to document and preserve your interview for years to come."
