4. Australian Paralympians' Stories

In 2009, the <u>Australian Paralympic Committee</u> (APC) established the Australian Centre for Paralympic Studies to retain historical, sport and business information to preserve its heritage, build its knowledge base and respond to requests for information about Paralympians and Paralympic sport. In 2010 the APC, signed an agreement with the National Library of Australia to record the oral histories of a number of the people who were responsible for the growth and success of Paralympic sport in Australia. To mark the fiftieth anniversary of the Paralympic Games in September 2010, the first priority has been to record the oral histories of Australia's first Paralympians. <u>Listen to their stories</u>.
