A team of journalists — including Melissa Harris and Mary Schmich — follow up with the families of seven Chicagoans from Terkel’s 1967 oral history.

“In 2009, after leaving the *Baltimore Sun* to work for the *Chicago Tribune*, Melissa Harris knew she had to get up to speed on the city’s people and history. She reached out to her new colleague Rick Kogan, who assigned her 10 books to read, including Studs Terkel’s *Division Street America*. Harris said she was captivated by Terkel’s 1967 oral history (and arguably his most renowned book) and had many questions: Who are these people? What happened to them? Do I know their children?
