10. Brisbane 100

Oral History Queensland was invited to participate in the Brisbane 100 Event on 1 October 2025 at the Brisbane City Hall. This event was part of the celebration to commemorate Brisbane becoming a large city in 1925 when many councils amalgamated to form one council body. Over these last 100 years Brisbane has transitioned from a sleepy town to a bustling city. Three members of OHQ participated:

Lena Volkova sat at a small table with a chair for herself and the other for a steady stream of people who shared their stories with her. She said, “Everyone loved Brisbane.” They were talkative and generous with their stories. Lena will edit the recorded stories and give participants a copy. They got a good taste of what oral history is, being a bit apprehensive at the beginning, but then starting to open up and talk frankly about their experiences of Brisbane. Some spoke about their research and shared their knowledge of its history, as well as snippets of their life stories related to our city.

Anne Monsour and the Australian Lebanese Historical Society used pull up banners which were very popular. People were reading them and then telling stories. The story of the Lebanese in South Brisbane is very significant with the first shops being in the cultural centre area.

Suzanne Mulligan was unable to attend in person but she provided a short video about two of her interviewees who had lived in Brisbane. This video was added to a loop which played in the City Hall with Digital Songlines and the biography of Premier Theodore on the LCD screen in the far left of the room as you would have seen it as a speaker. It was played many times.

If OHQ attends a similar future event, we would need to have better signage such as that which the Australian Lebanese Historical Society had. Also we needed more room and a quieter space.

14. New Zealand Historical Association Conference, Auckland, New Zealand

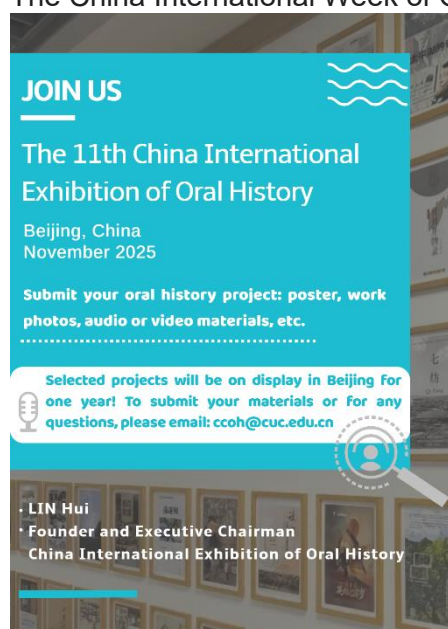
