6. Hazel de Berg Award for Excellence in Oral History

At the recent national conference Dr Karen George was awarded the Hazel de Berg Award for Excellence in Oral History. Karen's extensive career exemplifies all that is inspiring about working in oral history. She has spent many years amplifying the voices of those normally overlooked or forgotten by others and has participated as an oral historian in some of the most important national projects in Australia, such as the 'Bringing Them Home' Oral History project (1999-2002) and the 'Forgotten Australians and Child Migrants Oral History project
